March 18, 2017, at


the PSE Archives Room in Charleston, IL, and should be able to



PSE Twenty-Sixth Annual Student Awards

Well, as you can see from the title of this article, we have officially surpassed the first quarter-century of time, where the PSE Alumni Assn. has been able to financially assist children of former PSE Dads at EIU. When we undertook this challenge in 1991, we had no realistic idea of how long it would go on, or how many students it would impact.

On Sunday, August 21, 2016, the PSE Alumni Assn. once again convened to make the PSE Student Award presentation, this time to a student beginning her senior year at EIU. Prior to those activities though, we sat down in our dining room for the standard fare of luncheon items and frosted sheet cake squares. The presence of a fairly sultry and sticky Sunday precipitated the move inside, where the luncheon was served to Jim, Jan and Michelle Fechner, PSE Board Pres. Jim Luthe, PSE Board member Boone Chaney, and Gary (PSE Treas.) & Sharon Brinkmeyer. What made this presentation significant, was two-fold. This was

With the presentation of a check for \$500 to Michelle Fechner, she became the <u>first</u> and only student within the PSE Student Awards

program, to have been awarded the maximum five hundred dollar award for all four years of her matriculation at EIU. Her record is safe for at least four more years. That is the happy part of this record-keeping. The sadder part is that she may have been the Iast EIU student to partake in this philanthropic enterprise that we embarked upon 25 years ago. For the last three presentations of the Student Award, Michelle has been the only recipient to receive a monetary award from PSE. If we don't receive any response to the application for a Student Award in the Spring 2017 PSE Newsletter, it will be the first time since 1991. If you know of someone either attending or planning to attend EIU (whose Dad was a Phi Sig here), make them aware of

the monetary assistance, or let us know about it, so we can follow up. And to you Michelle, Congratulations! We wish you well in your post-EIU work or additional education environment.

The PSE Website - An Update

In the Spring 2016 PSE Newsletter, I shared with you a lot of information relative to the then current status of the PSE website. We also highlighted the direction that the PSE Alumni Assn. was going to pursue, to get it accessibly operational again for all registered Brothers and those wishing to register. My last statement in the article about the website makeover stated "I'm sure more information will be forthcoming in the Fall 2016 Newsletter and who knows-it may be well underway or even completed by that time."

Well, here it is late Fall and I wish I could share a more optimistic view of where we are at right now, but I can't at this time. The Spring Newsletter article spelled out a simplistic viewpoint of the problems we were facing and a proposed solution by our retainered IT guru on staff at EIU. All along, he had told us that it could be well into the Fall 2016 semester before he could delve into the upgrade or makeover, depending on the severity of the problems within the website. That assessment came to us before the state financial problems in doling out monies to the state university system literally was crippling many schools, with EIU really feeling the brunt. That dilemma, coupled with some other internal issues, sent the EIU Fall 2016 school enrollment plummeting down from a high of nearly 12,000 students some five years ago to a current level of 7000-7500 students. Since the monies were not forthcoming from both the state coffers and student tuitions, EIU has had to make many drastic financial adjustments. Those included laying off some 300-400 EIU employees, no replacement hiring for normal retirement attritions, imposing mandatory non-paid days off (about one per month) and a hiring freeze. All of these actions impacted the schedule for our IT guru at EIU, by imposing additional work requirements on him to compensate for the loss of employees.

With his increased workload, he has had to pare back his time inputs for our website upgrade.

On Sept. 9th, we heard from our IT guy that there has been progress on the new website, now having the functionality of the old site, but on a new and updated platform. A link was enclosed for Jim Luthe and me to try out. After going to the link and perusing through the new website, I put together a couple of pages of questions and comments and emailed a request for a meeting on Sept. 20th. Three days earlier, the PSE Alumni Assn. had held a meeting, where the website was the major focus of attention. On Sept. 18th, our website administrator, Tom Swanson, emailed an excellent synopsis of our website concerns based upon the Alumni Assn. meeting we had just completed. After about a month, I sent an email to our IT guy, requesting a detailing of where we were in the process and received a prompt reply. It stated that he was sorry, but had had some end of the quarter work that he had to get done. He also stated on Oct. 18th that "The last email ('Tom Swanson') I received from you guys was fantastic detail, so that makes it much easier for me to make the changes. I should have an update for you by the end of the month." On Nov. 15th, I received a further email that stated he was sorry he hadn't made more progress on the PSE new site, but that it was close. I responded that I was finishing up the Fall PSE Newsletter and would like to share some information from him for this article. I then was gone for almost a week on a Thanksgiving time visit with out-ofstate family and returned with no further information to share with you at this time. So, there you go! You all now know as much as I know. I'm sure that we will be able to share much more information about the new website in the Spring 2017 PSE Newsletter and I believe it will highlight the ease of accessing and using the new PSE website.
