P.S.E. Alumni Static-Cling Decal For Everyone

As you no doubt noticed on the mailing information side of this Newsletter, there is a bold lettering notification of an enclosed FREE Phi Sigma Epsilon Alumni Assn. static-cling decal for each alum we have an address for. We hope you like it and proudly display it on your car window or home or wherever.

This decal style is actually borrowed and updated from an old decal design that we used some 30 years ago. However, back then you had to immerse the decal in warm water for a half-minute or so, before it would slide off the paper backing and onto the glass surface that you were applying it to. It was most often on a car window, but I have seen them on home windows and even beer pitchers or larger beer glasses. That technology didn't allow for the movement of the decal from one locale to another – it was glued in place. This new static-cling is infinitely changeable (not that you will even do that), but is removable for cleaning the glass it adheres to or moving it to different windows or glass surfaces. It mounts on the inside of a glass surface, displaying the design logo to all who see it. The story is still told around here, of an old decal on a car being seen by a passing car, and both vehicles were driven by Phi

Sig alumni, both unknown to the other. The drivers did eventually stop and introduced themselves, and I'm sure had some interesting things to tell each other.

This project has been in the works since the last Reunion – that was in June 2005. We wanted to update our logo decal and talked to Jim Porter ('70), who operates Porter Specialty Advertising in Elmhurst, IL. Jim ("Woody") provided us with the Reunion favor glasses and offered suggestions and help along the way to come up with this final design. Although everything is done digitally on computers anymore, we think this 5-color decal blends all of our colors and designs perfectly. We received them several weeks ago, right on time to go out with this Newsletter, as the PSE Alumni Assn. had planned. There is one free decal with every Newsletter that we mailed (approx. 700) and this is the last scheduled mass mailing, since many future Newsletter mailings will go out to your email address. The PSE Alumni Assn. received a letter in late September from a lady in Harrisburg, PA, informing us that her father, Robert R. Alter ('51), a member of Phi Sigma Epsilon at Eastern Illinois University, had passed away in St. Petersburg, FL.

The name rang a bell for me, so I started checking through some old Warbler yearbooks that I have and assimilating some old information tidbits that I remembered from college days at the House. If you'll allow yourself to regress in time for a little bit, you'll probably remember the same things I did. This is for any and all of you who lived in the Phi Sig House at 1509 Second Street. Remember the front room (or living room) that was adjacent to the meeting room? It was the room where most visiting, smokers and social functions took place. Do you remember any of the furniture that was in that room? You should remember at least one item from there, because you had to learn about it during your pledge period. Although it may have been moved about somewhat in the room, it was the light maple constructed bookcase with wood-framed glass sliding doors. It was about 3 feet tall by maybe 8 feet long and 1 foot in depth with numerous books and other items stored within it. Centered on top of it was a memorial brass engraving that stated that this bookcase was donated in memory of John M. Alter. That was the information that you were required to know about while pledging, along with so much else. John passed away in September 1955, while attending EIU (as a junior) and a member of Phi Sigma Epsilon. Donald R. Alter, a former History professor at Eastern, was a father to both John M. and Robert R. Alter, although the siblings had both been adopted, as had a sister. Robert was born in Charleston, IL, attended and graduated from Eastern and retired as an advertising salesman, having moved from the Lansing, MI area to St. Petersburg, FL in 1999. He was an avid outdoorsman and an accomplished pilot in the Albert Whitted Pilots Assn. in St. Peters-

burg, FL.

The bookcase survived all the turmoils of life at the Phi Sig House until the very end. When the House had been sold and was being readied for demolition, the bookcase was however, surreptitiously stolen from the House in the middle of the night, before it could be removed for safe storage. And so, to paraphrase Paul Harvey "now you know – the rest of the story."

PSE Sixteenth Annual Student Awards

Student Awards on Sunday, August 20, 2006, in Charleston, IL. The preceding Friday and Saturday had evolved from that heat into two days of cooler, rainy weather that culminated in a sunny, but comfortable Sunday, that we gladly accepted for our activities.

Having awarded money the previous two years to groups of seven Eastern students who counted Phi Sigs as their dads, we made a considerable adjustment downward this year. Only four students came forward to be awarded a check of \$500 dollars each for their discretionary use during this school year. Their parents (who are responsible for submitting their student's application) were also present for the formalities, but even so there were only a total of about 16 people in attendance for the Awards presentation. Donations to PSE Archives

On August 20, 2006, Garry Ernst ('64) attended the PSE Alumni Assn. Student Awards Luncheon & Presentation and as mentioned, donated an old Phi Sig gray wool long jacket that originally belonged to and was worn by older brother Charles Ernst ('60). This jacket was passed on down to Garry, and with both consenting, was donated to the PSE Alumi Assn. The accompanying picture shows the unfamiliar-style jacket which is herein described.

This jacket is about the same length as the more commonly remembered gray wool iconic jacket of the 60's and 70's with the gray leather sleeves. It has five red snap buttons instead of a zipper on the front and a red braid highlighting the diagonal pockets on the lower front sides. Also accentuating the arms are two parallel red braids that start below the full collar and traverse down to the elastic wristbands, which have two horizontal bands of red woven into the fabric of the wristbands. The gray background sew-on Phi Sigma Epsilon crest on the left chest is identical in color and appearance to that of the decal that was enclosed with this Newsletter and has a felt-like appearance to it. Below the crest are the Greek letters for Phi Sigma Epsilon in red (about 2" high), that are stitched into the jacket fabric and on the right chest is the cursively written name "Ernst" in red stitching. It really is and probably was an eye-catching jacket on campus at the time. I was told that there was a picture of someone wearing one in a late 50's or early 60's Eastern Warbler yearbook, but I have not seen that picture yet.

Charles Ernst ('60) and younger brother Garry ('64) are both retired, Charles living in Dow, IL (near or overlooking the Mississippi River) and Garry splitting his time between Panama City, FL and

Charleston, IL.

Several other donations have also been made to the PSE Alumni Assn. At the annual summer PSE Camp-In, Jeff Estes ('71) donated a lined, blue nylon jacket with yellow stitched Greek letters and a PSE paddle from his big brother. And from Ron Noren ('58) in Orange, CA, we received the following:
