Web Site Update by Tom Swanson

After several months of going live with our new website, it is time to review our progress. For the most part, the implementation has gone smoothly. There were several bumps along the way and it has been somewhat of a learning process. I'll try to review some of the problems, so that they can be avoided in the future.

The main problem I have noted is with initial registration. The key thing to remember is that when you enter your data, registration is not immediate. I've noted repeated instances where a member has entered their registration data and then immediately attempted to sign-on to the site. This results in a failed log-in attempt. Once you have entered your data, an e-mail is sent to me by the system advising of a user sign-up. I review your data against our existing list of members and, presuming I confirm you are one of us, I activate your membership. This activation then results in the system sending you an e-mail advising you accordingly. Bearing the above in mind, remember that you need to provide me with enough information to actually identify you, minimally your real name and city/state. We have actually had a member try to register providing only a username that gave me little clue as to whom he actually was. An e-mail to him got the needed information. I check my e-mail on a regular basis throughout the day and hopefully will have you activated within a short period of time. If it has been over 24 hours, e-mail me at tswan60940@aol.com.

Since we are all not getting any younger, the issue of memory comes into play. More than a few members have forgotten either or both of their username or password that you used to register initially. We can work with those problems and I'll outline the procedure. I have access to the username that you used when you registered. If you forget the username, you can e-mail me and I'll send you the information. Sometimes I note repeated failed log-in attempts and I'll simply send a reminder. If you've forgotten your password, then as long as you know your username, the system will send you an e-mail giving you the password. Just enter your username and click on "Forgot Password". A less frequent occurrence, but another possibility is that you've forgotten both your username and password and your e-mail address has changed (yes-it has happened). In that case, contact me with your new e-mail address. I will edit your user data to reflect the new e-mail address and then provide you with your username information. You can then follow the "Forgot Password" protocol and be back in business.

The final issue I'll deal with in this article relates to news items and forums. You've no doubt seen numerous news items on the front page of our site. While it appears that I have posted all of these items, it is simply part of the approval process that makes it appear that way. If you have news that you would like to share with the group, click on submit news and enter your story. As you've seen, it can also include a picture. Once you submit your item, the system advises me of a submitted news item. I then review it for appropriateness, determine the length of time for posting and OK the posting. The item then posts on the site and is e-mailed to all registered users. We also have a Forums page, where you can start discussion topics that are, or may be, of interest to members. Posts are limited to registered users and are not reviewed prior to posting (although we do reserve the right to delete offensive material). The Forums page also has a place to post your jokes and/or humorous stories. Finally, there is a Gallery page where we/you can post photos of various events. Currently there are albums relating to an earlier Camp-In and Student Awards, as well as current photos from the Sept. '09 PSE Camp-In. We are working out some problems in trying to make posting to the Gallery more accessible and will provide more information at a later date.

After an initial rush of registrations when we opened the site, we have slowed down significantly. The number of registered members, as a percentage of overall members, is relatively low. At the last PSE Board meeting we discussed this and felt that many of you are content to simply review the Newsletter and not avail yourselves of the website's other features. This is obviously a personal choice and has no bearing upon the success of the site. Simply remember that to use the full array of features available on our website, you must be a registered user.

In case you haven't heard, there will be a Phi Sigma Epsilon Alumni Assn. Reunion in Charleston, IL, on June 11-13, 2010. Golfers will gather at Angus Links Golf Course in Windsor, IL, just southwest of Mattoon, for a golf scramble. Angus Links (www.anguslinks.moon-fruit.com) is about 30 minutes from the hotel and will be open for breakfast. A modified shotgun start will begin at 9 AM.

A special prize will be awarded for the best pledge class performance, so mark your calendars and get your PB's ready for the challenge. Players can also enter as a foursome, twosome or as an individual.

The cost is only \$32/player and includes golf, ½ cart and prizes, which will be awarded Saturday night at the banquet. Tournament scoring will be done back at the hotel near our hospitality suite.

PSE Nineteenth Annual Student Awards

Sunday, August 23, 2009, became a day that promulgated a number of changes in the Phi Sigma Epsilon Alumni Assn. Student Awards program. About the only change that didn't occur this day was the weather-it was an absolutely gorgeous day for about any outdoor activity that you could envision. No rain or cloud-cover, no excessive humidity, no wind and no hoards of sweat bees, as in past Student Awards Sundays.

The weather was especially important this year because we changed our venue location, from the previous years Sister City (Southeast) Park pavilion with its fixed roof to my own backyard deck. As per the Spring 2009 Newsletter, we decided not to renew the pavilion because monetary concerns were forcing the PSE Board to rethink several issues that were normally part of the Awards program. In this case, since the pavilion was free upon signup, the previously catered luncheon took the hit. Since I live in Charleston and am usually fully involved in the Awards program, I decided that I could and did provide a location and the minimal cost meal for the invited guests and PSE Board members. The luncheon consisted of ½ lb. grilled hamburgers (technically called "Fluffy Burgers" by Morgan Meat Market in Mattoontrademarked name), a 10-different fresh fruit salad, supersweet corn on the cob, garden fresh tomatoes and condiments, a variety of drinks and my own famous brownies that I always make for any Phi Sig function at my house. Typically they are downed with beer, but we decided to forego that for the Awards day. I think everybody got enough to eat, although if Larry Arney had dropped any more burgers on the deck, we might have been short there. Present for the luncheon and awards and introduced beforehand was Larry, Laura & Landon Arney, Sharon Brinkmeyer, PSE Board president Jim Luthe, VP/Treasurer Gary Brinkmeyer and Board members Boone Chaney and Marv Randolph ("Steer").

Again, as per the last Newsletter, we stated that we were restricting the number of Student Awards to the same three students that received them last year, they being Landon Arney, Lita Hickey and Jennifer Moore. The reason was the same as for the meal-the money was not in the checking account because of lower interest income and expenses for the PSE website and upcoming June 2010 Reunion . At the PSE Golf outing in late May, Dan Hickey informed me that his daughter Lita, was transferring to a Chicago-area school and in July, Jeff Moore informed me that his daughter Jennifer was transferring to an Indiana school. So now we are down to one student to receive the monetary award, that being Landon Arney, son of Larry and Laura Arney of Effingham , IL . And he did receive that check from the PSE Alumni Assn.

However, again as stated in the Spring Newsletter, the aforementioned three students were only to receive Student Award checks from us for \$300, instead of the normal \$500. This was also due to our cost-cutting efforts, but was hinged upon the premise of there being three students receiving individual checks. With that now not being the case, the Board decided to revert back to the position of awarding \$500 stipends-and that is what Landon received for his second year at Eastern. Before I presented that to him though, I did a quick explanation to the assembled group of where our money comes from and the spate of sudden expenditures we were encountering. I then stated and apologized that I could no longer present the \$300 check that Landon was expecting (visibly saw jaws drop), but that I would have to present a \$500 check instead. Thereupon came a palpable sense of relief that normally only comes with a good BM. After all the official business of the day was over, obligatory pictures were taken with the banner and honored guests, whereupon everyone retreated to the new Phi Sig Annex and Archives Room. It was great watching people's reactions when they suddenly saw pictures of themselves from old school days. Old Crest - New Frame

As long as I can recall, there has always been the old, original crest-you remember the one I'm talking about. It hung in the living room of the 1509 Second St. fraternity house, until of course, that was no more. It was the shiny, pounded aluminum crest with the chains supporting the scales of justice and the checkered red and aluminum pattern on the shield that looked like the board from a game of checkers. I have old pictures from that living room that show that crest, nicely framed with a black felt background. But sometime since the demise of the chapter House in 1986, the crest had lost its original frame, possibly in those tumultuous days following the loss of the PSK charter. It sat from that time tucked away in the bowels of my second-story garage storage area until I completed the Phi Sig Annex in Fall 2007. Then, it was moved into that area until I requested that it be reframed and the PSE Board concurred.

Dick Swing was in attendance at the meeting where we decided to have reframing work done on it. He volunteered that his fiancé (Barb Dubrick) had a little framing business in Cissna Park and that she could do that whole project. It involved disassembling the whole crest from its original backing, clean and polish all the metal, re-square the back support board, install new black felt and a heavy-duty black frame with a glass cover incorporated into the frame to protect it. In the interim time between her receipt of it and our return of the finished product, she and Dick were married (on Valentines Day). Wedding planning always leads to

Eastern Illinois Athletics Hall of Fame Inductee

Homecoming Day (Oct. 17) was a beautiful Fall day, preceded by several days of rain that had threatened to move into the Homecoming weekend. There were distinguished alumni that were being recognized and former athletes that were being inducted into the EIU Athletic Hall of Fame that day, among them, Don Neece. Unfortunately, he was unable to attend the day's festivities, although he was still recognized at the football game halftime ceremonies. Don was one of our own athletes as mentioned in the Spring '09 Newsletter. While in high school at East Alton-Wood River, he qualified for state wrestling three times and placed sixth in the state his senior year. His success continued after arriving at EIU. He placed fourth in the 1962 NAIA wrestling tournament, earning All-American recognition. He was a three time All-Interstate Intercollegiate Athletic Conference selection, with a conference championship in 1964 and runner-up finishes in both 1963 and 1965. The Panthers went on to become IIAC champions his junior year, but Don's personal best came about his senior year. He earned NAIA First Team All-American wrestling honors in 1965 by winning the national championship in the 191–pound class. His nickname was "Beast" and judging from his wrestling accomplishments, I can see how he received that moniker. After graduation from EIU in 1965 he returned to his old high school, where he was a teacher, coach and athletic administrator, before recently retiring as the Assistant Superintendent at East Alton-Wood River High School.

Illinois Hall of Fame Inductee

Once again we have been informed that another EIU-Phi Sig alumnus has been chosen to be inducted into an Illinois Hall of Fame. This time however, it is into the Illinois Softball Coaches Association Hall of Fame and the recipient of that honor is Larry Gariepy ('66), a native of Bridgeport. He will be honored at a banquet in Bloomington, IL on Feb. 21, 2010.

Larry started coaching softball in 1981 at Crossville High School and in seven years put together a 105-15 record that included four regional championships and two "Sweet 16" appearances. In 1988 Crossville consolidated with Carmi High School becoming Carmi-White County High School . Larry became the head coach of the Lady Bulldogs in 1991 and over the next 13 years compiled a 270-96 record, winning

eight regionals, two sectionals and ten North Egypt Conference titles. The 1991 club finished fourth in the Class A state tournament, while the 1997 team finished third. He was the Southern Illinois Coaches Assn. Coach of the Year in 1997 and the Illinois Coaches Assn. Coach of the Year in 2001. He retired after the 2002 season, moved to Pope County and was quickly hired to lead the Lady Pirates high school softball program. He also started a junior high school program in 2004 and he still coaches that group. Overall his record 441-145, which is a .735 winning percentage, not bad for a guy who initially dreamed of being a football coach in the fall and a baseball coach in the spring. Congratulations!

Late afternoon finds everybody getting into chores in preparation for the weekend coup-de-grace, that being our annual fish fry, sweet corn-on-the-cob, homemade slaw, tomato slices and anything else from all the leftover foods. It's not a good weekend to be on a diet. The fresh fish filets are always provided by our resident fisherman Gene Everett and generally consist of walleye, crappie, bluegill, catfish and bass (both largemouth and stripers). As we always say, "It don't get no better than this". This year was a special year too, because we were able to celebrate the March '09 marriage of Paul Klopfenstein ('68) and new wife Betty. Champagne toasts were offered to all present by the new couple, as was wedding cake. The Brothers encircled the new bride and sang the "Sweetheart" song (clean version-although it was hard for some to remember those words) and what I call the "Lavalier" song that starts out "Phi Sigma Girl" (same with remembering the words). The couple was presented with a keepsake, hanging wedding plate with congratulatory messages from everybody present. The second campfire is already going, so when the cleanup is completed everyone vegetates, letting digestion take its normal course, sometimes rudely punctuated with malodorous outbursts from the encircled group. Another Brother of the Heart now "belongs to the ages". On August 9, 2009, Steve A. Grishaber (better known to most of us as "Count") passed away from the cumulative effects of the disease he suffered with for most of his life, Multiple Sclerosis. I know for a fact that many of us considered him a role model for how to lead your life in the face of great adversity. Steve was diagnosed with the malady shortly after graduating from Eastern in 1971, and as with most who are so afflicted, it gradually robbed him of some senses and wreaked havoc on various organs and parts of his body. In the face of all that though, I never heard him once complain-he just kept chugging on. He was probably considered legally blind, but on more than one occasion he completed 18 holes of golf, most recently on May 30, 2009, at the Phi Sig Open in Grant Park, IL. Last year I partnered with Steve, Ken Dennison and Kirk Davis and I know for a fact that he regularly hit the ball better than I did. Then he would drop into his deep-seating position with his knees almost into his face, I assume for comfort, before riding on to the next hole. I gave the 2009 group picture shown in the golf article to his wife Camille, and although it may be hard to see in this photocopy, it pictures "Count" with a smile of contentment and satisfaction, as if to say "I can still play golf with you guys". Steve is survived by Camille, a son (Steve) and two grandsons, as well as numerous other relatives. At his visitation, 12 of us Brothers gathered together to pay our respects to both our Brother and friend and his family-and I would also be remiss if I didn't thank Wally Kos for exemplifying the phrase "He ain't heavy-he's my brother" over the many years of caring for the "Count". Resting in the casket near his head was Steve's beloved gray Phi Sig ball cap. Rest in Peace Brother!

Donations of Phi Sig memorabilia continue to come in for display in the new PSE Annex and Archives Room on the second story of my garage. Since last Spring, six different Brothers have contributed items from their own personal keepsakes to be shared amongst other similar mementoes of our days past. They are:

Bob Brendel – Bob's pledge book reveals the kind of information we all had to learn as we continued though our pledgeship. A lot of fun stuff mixed in with serious info opens a window that marks each pledge book as a unique time capsule. A small yellow-cover, spiral-bound notebook like reporters carried.

Garry Ernst – In the early '50's Garry's sister was pledging Delta Zeta sorority at Eastern. They had a tradition of obtaining names from different fraternity members that were on campus at the time. These were signed onto a china dinner plate (plain white) that had been segmented like pie slices with a magic marker for the different fraternities, including of course, Phi Sigma Epsilon. Because of the names in our segment, Garry felt it might be something that we would be interested in displaying and it absolutely is. As best as I can decipher, here are those names, with only a couple that were not clearly legible. They are shown as written on the plate, with parentheses indicating my

additions based upon our composite membership list. They are: Arlin Rice, Lloyd Ludwig, Wayne Baker, J (John) Alter, Phil Moore, JRJ (I assume John R. Jones), Tom F (Faller), Gene Frantz, Gary P (Pope)-"Skip", Bill Ferguson, Ron Kitchen, Gene McD (McDivitt), Joe Wolfe, Ken L (Ludwig), Don Pars (Parsons) and the following partial names: C.J. ____, Bob F___, "Ed", Phil ____, C. Da___. Any help out there, let me know.

Roger Haberer – Roger called and said he would like to drop off this blanket for the collection. It was probably like a formal or party favor and is like a small lap blanket that you would use at a football game with your sweetheart. It is a black, wool-like composition, about 4 x 5 feet in size, with a gold-stitched border all around it and a large outlined PSE crest centered on it. We have a similar one donated by Roger McCoy, so they must have been a popular item.

Ron Rami – While awaiting my car repair in Cookeville, TN (see above story), I spent the night at Ron Rami's home. Amongst all of our varied conversations that evening, Ron left the room and returned with these items for the Archives. PSE paddle that was given to "Ron –'70 from Winter Class '68". Hmmm! Ron doesn't remember exactly why it came about unless he was pledge trainer or the like. Also donated was a PSE lapel pin and a package of PSE adhesive labels. Ron also donated to my beer room, six different size and brands of beer glasses that came from his days in school here at Eastern. Let's see-I wonder where they were stolen from. Was it Roc's or Sporty's or Ike's or maybe Chink's. Or how about Rendezvous? Well, wherever. Thanks Ron!

Randy Rothrock – In early September, Randy emailed me and said that Al Ortegren was coming up to see him and that they wanted to come over for a visit and to see the new PSE Annex & Archives room. We had a great time catching up on the past on a sunny mid-September day drinking a cold one on the deck. Randy also brought along several items for the Archives, the first a maroon sweatshirt with a silkscreened white PSE crest outlined on it. It too, is like a lot of the old sweatshirts and tshirts-it has shrunk a lot over the years. The other donation was the keepsake football from the EIU intramural flag football championship game in 1968, which Phi Sigma Epsilon won. Randy doesn't remember who it was that we beat-can anybody out there help us out before I have to go to the library files to find out.

Steve Whitley – Steve had found these in his garage a while back and asked me about our interest in them. He thought they were formal-like favors. The first item was a small, red leather zippered carrying case for small toiletry items like fingernail clippers, file, comb, scissors etc. It has a small brass (1 inch) crest affixed to the exterior case and that crest is the older style, similar to the picture of the reframed crest shown in this Newsletter. The other item, also leather, has a Tri-Sig brass crest affixed to it and is about 6 inches wide by 12 inches tall. Inside is a fold-up dress hanger and some straps for attaching jewelry and other personal effects. Steve thought it probably belonged to his wife Jolene.
