As you know from the June, 2002 Newsletter, the PSE Alumni Assn. noted in a front page article entitled "The Case of the Missing Newsletter" that the Fall 2001 edition of the Newsletter had not been assembled. The article continued to state that the financial condition of the Association precluded that mailing, primarily due to the reduced revenues coming forth as a result of the sluggish economy and almost nothing interest rates on savings. We reluctantly were resigned to asking for a show of support from you, both constructively in your opinions and for any financial help you could offer. ## PSE Tidbits

**After presenting the story entitled "Hall of Fame Inductees"** in the Spring 2002 PSE Newsletter, I received a very thoughtful letter from Dennis Vidoni (1968) stating that the story on Larry Kanke reminded him to think of his own cousin, Gene Vidoni, who was inducted into the EIU Hall of Fame on September 8, 2001. I had forgotten to make any mention of that honor accorded only a few special alumni and even fewer Phi Sig Brothers. Some additional details on that induction that I overlooked are as follows, as reprinted from our local newspaper of that date:

"Gene Vidoni, Class of 1965 with a master's in '74, was a baseball/football standout who went on to earn significant coaching honors at Casey-Westfield High School. Lettering six times at EIU from 1960 through '65, Vidoni was an honorable mention Little All-American defensive end in 1964, team Most Valuable Player, Peoria Journal Star All-State and First Team All IAC. He was also team MVP in baseball as a catcher in '65 and Second Team All Conference.

Following graduation he played in the San Francisco Giants minor league system. Vidoni started the baseball program at Casey High School where he taught and coached from 1969 through 2000.

He is a member of the Illinois High School Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame, and received special recognition for 25 years service from the American College Baseball Coaches Association. In 1995 and 1999, Vidoni was chosen to Who's Who Among American Teachers. He currently is retired and resides in Bossier City, La."

**New Board Member - At the February 23, 2003, P.S.E.** Board of Directors meeting held in Charleston at the home of Gary Brinkmeyer, the issue of New Business arose near the end of the meeting. With the advent of the new website for the Phi Sigma Epsilon Alumni Assn. being assimilated and managed by Larry Carli ("Carls" - '67), our computer website guru, it seemed only practical that he be nominated to the Board in order to seek his input on a regular basis. There being no dissent to this proposal, he was nominated, contacted, was willing to serve and will attend the next meeting on June 22, 2003, again at the home of Gary Brinkmeyer.

**The first of two inductees into the EIU Journalism Hall of Fame** in October of 2001 was Jim Hanks ('47), a former editor of the *Daily Eastern News* who was chosen because of his excellence as an editor and because he led a distinguished career with continued support to the university. Jim started at Eastern when there were no journalism classes, the closest thing being some modified English classes that were called 101J and 102J.

Because of time spent in the military, his projected 1944 graduation actually took place in 1947, when he graduated with a major in social science (history-oriented) and a double minor in English and business (denoted as commerce at that time). After working as a teacher in several schools and serving as a principal for 5 years, Jim changed gears and began working for State Farm Insurance in Jackson, MS in 1953. After retiring in 1988, he could look back on a 35-year career that encompassed work in five different states for State Farm and culminated in his final position as a regional vice president for the state of Indiana. Presently living in West Lafayette in retirement, Jim has three children and eight grandchildren who, no doubt, share time with him.

Prior recognition accorded to Jim was his receipt of a Distinguished Alumni Award in 1987 and being cited as one of 100 individuals who had distinguished the university in its first 100 years, that being presented during Eastern's Centennial celebration in 1996.

Congratulations Jim, from the PSE Alumni Assn., upon being inducted into the EIU Journalism Hall of Fame and also upon your previous recognitions from Eastern.

## A Life Well Lived

She was born on March 22, 1914 and was lost to the ages on November 3, 2002, succumbing to the effects of a stroke suffered some five months earlier.

Stella Foreman was a grand lady who was admired and loved by all who had the experience to know her. Although unknown to many of you who are reading this Newsletter, she was a fixture of popularity and respect for many Phi Sigs during the decade of the Sixties, especially the earlier 60's. She and her son David, along with a myriad of college men renting rooms from her over the years and her "special" Phi Sig boys kept the 1436 Seventh Street address an in-place to be. You see, Dave Foreman ('66) was a Phi Sig brother and Stella was the embodiment of a Phi Sig Mom to all who knew her at that time. And did I mention her other love – a small beagle dog she named Siggy. Stella loved animals, especially dogs and spent many hours, even days, dog or cat-sitting for friends who trusted her.

I lived at Stella's home for the first year while attending Eastern, followed by three years at the Phi Sig House. Both residences conjure up special memories, but her home and its visitors became the impetus for my pledging Phi Sigma Epsilon. Many of Dave's Phi Sig friends would congregate at her home on any given night, but it seemed especially true on Sundays when a group gathered to work on homework or grab a bite to eat next door and bring it back to Stella's. Her home and its

refrigerator always seemed to be open for her "boys". Some of those old Phi Sigs that frequented her home were Bob Hoffek, Tom Homma, Roger McCoy, Mike LaGesse, Loren Hunsaker, and many more whose names escape me at this time. Being at Stella's house was just like being at your own home and Stella was everybody's surrogate mother while you were at school. And school was just across the street too. Her address put her home next to Short Stop restaurant on the north (towards Roc's). Today it is Domino's Pizza, but Old Main is still across the Lincoln Ave. four-lane.

Stella was a school teacher, primarily in the Charleston school district. Over her 36-year teaching span after graduating from Eastern, she taught first grade for 29 of those years in the same room at the old Lincoln elementary school. After "retiring" in 1979, she volunteered for weekly work at the Tarble Arts Center, read weekly to groups of children and listened to them read to her and traveled with her friends. Because Stella and I shared a same birthdate, we always got together on that day. She insisted on babysitting my own children every year on New Year's Eve until they were both out of high school, so that Sharon and I could go out for awhile and know that they were in the safest hands. That was the kind of lady she was. I miss her kindly smile, her gentle laugh and her love of life, but mostly I will miss her friendship.

# THIRTEENTH ANNUAL STUDENT AWARDS

It hardly seems possible that 12 years have gone by already since the inception of the PSE Alumni Assn. Student Awards in 1991, but this year's Awards will mark the THIRTEENTH year that we have given financial assistance.

As you may well know by now, the Phi Sigma Epsilon Alumni Association has embarked on an annual Student Awards program to financially assist identified children of former Phi Sigs (P.S.E., that is), Delta Chapter at Eastern Illinois University. The Association has been able to award grants totalling over \$35,000 the past 12 years.

With the receipt of this Newsletter, eligibility is open for you to submit to the P.S.E. Alumni Association, the names of children who will be attending EIU in Fall 2003 or those already in school as full-time undergraduates.

The cutoff date for submission of the Student Award Information questionnaire form in this Newsletter is July 15, 2003. Upon receipt and verification of children attending or about to attend EIU, notification will be forwarded to you regarding the Student Award. These awards will be presented on Sunday, August 24, 2003 in Charleston. Only one monetary award will be granted per family. This monetary grant is free of all payback and has no provisions as to how it must be used. Additionally, it is restricted by age to those 25 or younger and the PSE Board also reserves the right to make discretionary exceptions to the above-noted guidelines on a case-by-case basis.
