This past Summer at the Annual Phi Sig Camp-In, I received a copy of an article that was gleaned from the Chicago Tribune Magazine, dated January 26, 2003, (page 8). It seems appropo to make mention of this article at this time, not only because Chicago just received their first substantial snowfalls of the winter, but because it is an interview with Wally Kos, an EIU Phi Sig who graduated in 1971, and who presently is the Cook County Highway Superintendent and also oversees snow removal. Having been in that position now for six years, I'm sure he could relay some unbelievable experiences from that time, but I will adhere to the text of the article and just relay his responses to several questions. When asked "Do you look forward to snow season?", he responds "I pray for no snow, but my maintenance crew and my kids pray for it. His response to "How much do you and your crew maintain?" yielded "About 500 lane-miles of highway system . . .

We've got five maintenance field districts with approximately 50 people in each . . . When there's a snowstorm we've got about 60 to 70 pieces of equipment out there." And to the question "What do you like most about your job?", he replies "It's never knowing what's coming at me day to day . . . There's [snowplow] drivers out there who've been doing this for 20 years. They do good work that often goes unappreciated. When we do our work, it doesn't hit the news."

Personally speaking as a friend, I daresay that Wally's efforts are greatly appreciated by the majority of those affected by his department staff and equipment. Gene Newport actually sent me the information contained herein just after the birth of my first grandson (over 2 years ago), so I must profusely apologize to him for not getting this disseminated to you, but at the same time thank him for putting forth his thoughts that evolved into this column. Gene graduated from EIU in 1957 and then attended the Univ. of Illinois, where he completed his Masters and Ph.D. while teaching as a Grad Assistant. He took a full-time faculty position at the Univ. of Nebraska-Omaha in 1962 and in 1971 moved to Birmingham, AL in a position at the Univ. of Alabama. He retired at age 62 in August 1997 after 40 years of teaching and administrative duties at 3 different universities.

With retirement life ahead of him, Gene started doing something in fun, that within the workplace he was paid to do. Most of us know that modern academics are generally expected to generate professional articles or books for publication, and Gene fulfilled that obligation, authoring, co-authoring or editing seven textbooks. Now bereft of academic pressures, he decided to write a fun book about management called "Management: Up, Down and Inside Out". He published it with 1stBooks Library in Bloomington, IN, a firm that is the largest distributor of electronic books in the world, so if you desire you can download it on your computer, but it can also be purchased in a paperback version worldwide. It was copyrighted in 1997 and published in January 2000. Now having gotten the writing bug and working with 1stBooks again, he took on and completed a second book, called "Country Music for Laughin', Lovin', and Livin' It Up", which was published in July 2001. A press release entitled "Former Business School Dean Goes Country" offers an author's note stating, "This book's about country music, but it ain't like nothin' you've ever laid your eyes on before. It's chock-full of song lines about heartthrobs and love . . . A few may make you laugh 'til you cry, and many will have you day-dreamin' in the middle of the night." 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### EIU Distinguished Alumnus "One of Our Own"

William L. Robinson ('76), better known as "Robo" to everyone who knows him, was back in Charleston, IL on Saturday, October 25, 2003, as part of a group of six EIU graduates to receive the EIU 2003 Distinguished Alumni Award. This award begins by an alumnus being nominated for the award, but ultimately the winners are chosen by the EIU Alumni Assn. and have been since 1973. Being contacted by the Alumni Association's Executive Director Steve Rich, was his first inkling that he had even been nominated. The stipulations for nomination are that the nominee becomes eligible after six years as an alumnus and that he (she) shall have achieved or accomplished something of importance in their career or lives since graduating.

That can certainly be said of "Robo". He presently lives in California, where he is the Vice-President/General Manager of one of eight business units in the Pepsi Bottling Group dynasty, heading up over 3600 employees and amassing annual sales over one billion (that's a "b") dollars.
